Short cuts in life always lead to downfall. In one sense, Gatsby's rags-to-riches success story makes him an embodiment of the American dream. He begins his life with very poor background. "Who are you, anyhow?" broke out Tom. "You are one of the bunch that hangs around Meyer Wolfsheim—that much I happen to know. I have made a little investigation into your affairs"

Gatsby's money did not come from inheritance, as he would like people to believe, but from organized crime. He is selling liquor illegally. The people who came in the party of Gatsby, knows nothing about him. They don't even saw Gatsby once in their lifetime. Some who are regular visitors, they also don't know about Gatsby. They are gathering only to enjoy the lavish parties, drinking and all other pleasures.

"People were not invited- they went there. They got into automobiles which bore them out to Long Island, and somehow they ended up at Gatsby's door. Once there they were introduced by somebody who knew Gatsby, and after that they conducted themselves according to the rules of behavior associated with amusement parks. Sometimes they came and went without having met Gatsby at all, came for the party with simplicity of heart that was its own ticket of admission." (Fitzgerald)

In fact, Gatsby himself keeps his identity private because he doesn't want to all people to know much about him, except few like Nick Carraway (cousin of Daisy) just whether he could arrange his meeting with Daisy. So, his friendship with Nick really begins to blossom only after he finds out that Nick is Daisy's cousin. In assessing Gatsby, one must examine his blind pursuit of Daisy. Everything he does, every purchase he makes, every party he throws, is all part of his grand scheme to bring Daisy back into his life for good. In one sense, this is a lovely romantic gesture, but in another sense, it perpetuates a childish illusion (Maurer). By being so focused on his dream of Daisy, Gatsby moves further and further into a fantasy world. His inability to deal with reality sets him outside the norm and, eventually, his holding on to the dream leads to his death. He didn't get his love back, However his every steps towards Daisy making him away from her. He is completely unable to realize that his dream is not a reality and so stands watching for a sign from Daisy, the sign that he never received. Until his last moment he was waiting for the phone call of her. He sees what he is doing as noble, honorable, and purposeful. There is the futility of his task as he becomes a parody of his former self. He can't wait to distance himself from his past in terms of his family, but yet he lives his adult life trying to recapture the past he had with Daisy. What makes matters worse, too, is that he is in love with the idea of Daisy, not Daisy as she herself is. In this way their love was shattered into pieces rather than ending together, they end up alone. Daisy chose her husband tom Buchanan over Jay Gatsby.

She just hid herself behind the curtain or we can say behind the back of Tom Buchanan and let everyone raise their suspicion towards Gatsby. The husband of Myrtle shot Gatsby at the end, and there Daisy doesn't even bother to attend his funeral. In fact, she left the town immediately with her family. That's why Nick form his opinion about Daisy.

> "I called up Daisy half an hour after we found him, called her instinctively and without hesitation. But she and Tom had gone away early that afternoon, and taken baggage with them."

> "....They were careless people, Tom and Daisy- They smashed up things and creatures and then retreated back into their money or their vast carelessness, or whatever it was that kept them together, and let other people clean up the mess they had made...." (Fitzgerald)

In 'The Great Gatsby' F Scott Fitzgerald symbolizes both the corrupted Dream and the original uncorrupted Dream through the character of Jay Gatsby. Gatsby thought that money is the only solution to his problems (Hanzo). That's why he started pursuing money from the

Indeed, the only unhappy couple to survive "unscathed" is Daisy and Tom, who eventually decide to retreat into the cocoon of wealth despite their marital problems. The end of Jay Gatsby brings pity in the eyes of reader because he died all alone in waiting for a phone call from Daisy which never came. Not even after his death. Narrator has clearly mentioned the hollowness of materialistic lives in the city.

> "I thought of Gatsby's wonder when he first picked out the green light at the end of Daisy's dock. He had come a long way to this blue lawn, and his dream must have seemed so close that he could hardly fail to grasp it. He did not know that it was already behind him, somewhere back in that vast obscurity beyond the city, where the dark fields of the republic rolled on under the night..."
